FEMINISM: Is it really about "equality", or is it a male-hating, heterophobic, family-destroying cult based on Marxism and Gynocentrism? (A compilation of quotes by Jason Dale with updated and expanded introduction – 25th September 2015)

Erin Pizzey; English family care activist, tireless advocate for both men and women's rights and founder of one of the first internationally recognized women's refuges in the world once said that "Family life was and always will be the foundation of any civilization. Destroy the family and you destroy the country" (From Erin Pizzey's essay "The Planned Destruction of the Family").

Central to the survival of the family and the raising of good, responsible, productive, mentally astute and emotionally healthy children who will carry forward the beacon of humanity into the future is the relationship between man and woman, father and mother, husband and wife, partner and partner. Whatever your gender, ethnicity, culture and personal beliefs may be; there can surely be no greater gift for our children than the living example of two biological parents who mutually love, respect and support one another in a nurturing and protective home and family environment.

It must be emphatically stated at this juncture that the author of this article and compilation has no regard whatsoever for "political correctness". Contrary to the sentiments aggressively promoted by the Feminist movement; homosexuality is NOT a natural alternative nor is it a replacement for heterosexual relationships between men and women. Indeed, as the evidence presented shall clearly demonstrate; homosexuality, promiscuity and sexual debauchery are the primary tools used by Feminism to divide men and women and to create a destabilized society where children are raised and indoctrinated by the state and not by their parents. As pointed out by filmmaker, producer and activist Aaron Russo; the Women's Liberation Movement during the 1960's and 1970's was funded by the Rockefeller Foundation with the express goal to destabilize society, tax women and usher in a new world order. Indeed, the Central Investigation Agency ("CIA") actively used Feminism and feminist propaganda outlets like Ms. Magazine to aid in that agenda. Far from being liberated from an allegedly oppressive male "patriarchy", women will be enslaved alongside men with institutionalized propaganda, escalating state power and spiralling debt.

Feminism is both a champion and a sock puppet for cultural Marxism, and unsurprisingly; truth will become the first casualty – either by distortion or by omission – and universities, schools and corporate/government funded media outlets will all help to make that happen. The *Declaration of Feminism* cited below openly advocates for the abandonment of men, the destruction of marriage, the practice of witchcraft and the *rewriting of history* according to a Marxist narrative (Lehmann & Sullinger, 1971). With the relentless digitization of printed material in the information age and beyond, the author will not be surprised if works such as "*Sex and Culture*" (Joseph Daniel Unwin, 1934) eventually disappear. After all, Unwin studied 80 primitive tribes and 6 known civilizations through 5,000 years of history and found a "*positive correlation between the cultural achievement of a people and the sexual restraint they observe*" (Huxley, Aldous, 1946. "Ethics.", In: Ends and Means. London: Chatto & Windus, pages. 311–12). Unwin also pointed out that increasing levels of sexual liberation will bring with it an irrevocable loss of social cohesiveness, impetus and purpose (Unwin, J.D., 1927. "Monogamy as a Condition of Social Energy," The Hibbert Journal, Vol. XXV, page 662). Novelist and author Aldous Huxley described "*Sex and Culture*" as a work of "utmost importance". Needless to say, Unwin's findings throw mud in the face of Feminist claims.

For decades, Erin Pizzey has opposed and challenged the divisive and bigoted cornerstone of Feminist doctrine which portrays the entire male gender class as a domineering, exploitative and abusive bourgeoisie seeking to perpetually victimize and oppress the helpless female gender proletariat. And of course, males are discouraged and even barred from taking an active role in any discussion about gender politics or gender relations, a trend which can be traced back to the birth of the Women's Suffrage Movement well over a century and a half ago (Seneca Falls Convention, 1848). It is noteworthy to mention that the early Suffragettes were not foreign to the anti-male tactics of their contemporary Feminist counterparts. Tellingly, they played an active role in the White Feather Campaign of World War I which sought to publicly humiliate military age men and even boys for not being in military uniform and serving their country, and in so doing highlighted the perpetual unholy alliance between the state and divisive ideologies.

Feminism also rides on the shoulders of much older giants than Marxism or the early Woman's Suffrage movement. As researcher and activist Peter Wright thoroughly and brilliantly documents on his website

gynocentrism.com; the "dominant or exclusive focus on [females] in theory or practice" ("gynocentrism") can be traced back to 12th century Europe. Overwhelmingly, notable academic C.S. Lewis describes this social revolution as a "feudalisation of love" which by comparison renders the European Renaissance "a mere ripple on the surface of literature". (1936, C.S. Lewis. "The Allegory of Love", chapter 1).

Like Erin and perhaps like many of you; I have often (quite ironically) been told by my detractors that "Not All Feminists Are Like That! (NAFALT)". Somehow, challenging or disagreeing with Feminism has become synonymous with hating women and hating "equality". Yet the true nature of any socio-political movement is not defined by propaganda or by manipulated dictionary definitions, but rather by the actions and by the words and ideas expressed in speech and writing by that movement's most vocal, celebrated and influential leaders and adherents across the history of its movement.

People ultimately become what they "worship" or believe, and Feminism's most vocal, celebrated and influential leaders and adherents will play the greatest role in shaping the belief systems and actions of many of its followers. After all, actions are driven by underlying beliefs. As a human thinketh and feel, so shall the human do, and so shall the human become. Moreover, beliefs and cultural narratives don't have to be factual or "true" in order to take root in the minds of humans. After all, as individuals like Lenin, Hitler and Goebbels understood; a lie which is repeated often enough eventually gets widely accepted as truth.

With this understanding in mind; the *man as powerful perpetrator* and *woman as powerless victim* narrative is demonstrably central to the Feminist doctrine (underscored by Feminism's giant predecessors), and this belief and narrative has not only fostered animosity and resentment between the genders but ultimately threatens to tear apart the very sacred fabric which holds society together – the family.
